A LETTER FROM ANDREA SKOLKIN, CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER...

Dear One World Friends,

In the past twelve months, we have seen many changes taking place at OneWorld Community Health Centers, Inc., and we will no doubt see many more changes in the upcoming year. Our clinic experienced tremendous growth in 2008, and provided health care to 16,453 people throughout the Greater Omaha-Metro Area. This was an increase of 26% over the prior year. The vast majority of these patients would likely have otherwise gone without health care, had it not been for OneWorld and our community partners. While this kind of growth is a testament to the good work OneWorld has accomplished in partnership with our community supporters, it is also a sign of the increasing burden healthcare costs present to families in Omaha. While it makes us proud to continue to

expand our reach into the community, it is also somewhat disheartening that the need for our services continues to increase.

In 2008, OneWorld opened our first official satellite location, Cass Family Medicine, in Plattsmouth, Nebraska. Over 1,500 patients were seen at Cass Family Medicine in its first full year of operation. We look forward to growing this number significantly in the next year. OneWorld also continued to expand its services at our main clinic in Omaha. We were excited to receive two major federal grant awards in 2008, which provided funding to expand both our behavioral health and oral health programs. These grant awards are proof positive that OneWorld is operationally and financially strong, and that we are well poised to continue our

expansion of much needed medical and dental services in the future.

OneWorld also grew our technological infrastructure in 2008, through the first phase of implementation of the NextGen electronic health record system. The second and final phase of the implementation will take place in the summer of 2009. OneWorld will be the first community health center in Nebraska or Iowa with a fully implemented electronic health records system. This system will allow the clinic to collect data on a number of healthcare measures, and continue to ensure a high quality of care for our patients.

As we look ahead to the next twelve months, there is no doubt that the need for our services will continue to increase, and we will continue to provide

the highest quality health care to all those who need us, regardless of where they live, how much money they make, or what language they speak. We thank you, our community partners, for your support of our efforts, and we look forward to sharing our successes with you.

OUR HISTORY...

OneWorld Community Health Centers, Inc. (formerly the Indian Chicano Health Center) was established as a volunteer, free clinic 39 years ago to address health access issues of patients with financial, cultural and linguistic barriers to care. OneWorld is now the largest

provider of primary health care services in South Omaha and is the only primary care clinic that has a majority bilingual and bicultural staff, a sliding fee scale for patients without insurance, entitlement enrollment, on-site pharmacy, vision and other services.

HERE ARE SOME OF THE MOST NOTABLE MILESTONES FROM OUR 39-YEAR HISTORY:

1970

The Clinic was established as a walk-in evening medical clinic that utilized volunteer providers.

1974

Received our first United Way funding.

1974 through 1994

Continued to operate as a grass-roots, volunteer health center with only one to two paid providers.

1995

Hired our first full-time Executive Director.

1999

Moved to our previous location (36th & Q Streets) with 15 staff members following a small capital campaign.

2001

Received our designation as a federally qualified health center and was awarded our first federal operating grant award from the Bureau of Primary Health Care.

2002

Received Joint Commission accreditation.

2003

Changed our name from the Indian-Chicano Health Center to OneWorld Community Health Centers, Inc., to better reflect our changing patient base.

2005

Moved into our current location in the Historic Livestock Exchange Building.

2006

Formed a partnership with the Ronald McDonald House Charities – Omaha Chapter to develop the Caremobile (mobile dental van) program.

2008

Opened our second location, Cass Family Medicine, in Plattsmouth, Nebraska.

OUR SERVICES... HEALTH CARE FOR ALL AGES

The OneWorld family of health centers provides affordable primary medical, dental and behavioral health services in a culturally respectful manner with special attention to the underserved. We accept Medicaid, Medicare and most private insurance. We also offer discounts for patients without insurance (according to ability to pay).



Primary Health Care Services for all ages:

OneWorld provides primary health care services to people of all ages, including well-child checks, school physicals, annual adult check-ups and physicals, and annual exams for women.

Women's health:

Because nearly 60% of OneWorld's patients are women, OneWorld provides a full menu of health services for women of all ages, including gynecological care, preventative care and education, and annual exams. We are a participant in the Every Woman

Matters program, which provides annual exams to women over the age of 40, at no cost to them. We are also a participant in the Title X Reproductive Health Program, which provides funding for family planning and preventative health screening services.

Pre-natal care, midwifery & obstetrics:

Our clinic employs family physicians, nurse practitioners, midwives, and partners with UNMC and Creighton University medical students to take care of women during their pregnancy and delivery. Once babies are born, our board certified

pediatric specialists provide first-class care. Annually, OneWorld also provides prenatal care for over 150 adolescents.



Pediatric care: Our clinic's health care providers include 4 board certified pediatric specialists with over 30 years of combined experience. OneWorld families also have access to counselors for parenting and nutrition education. We also assist families with Kids Connection enrollment. From well childcare, sniffles and sneezes, immunizations, lead screening, and complex medical needs, OneWorld is caring for tomorrow's leaders, today.

Pharmacy: OneWorld contracts with the Hope Pharmacy, located on the first floor of OneWorld's Clinic in

the historic Livestock Exchange Building. The pharmacy offers affordable medications through 340b pricing (a federal buying program that provides significantly discounted prescriptions). The pharmacy also enrolls patients in pharmaceutical manufacturer programs, which provide additional discounts for high cost medications needed for longer time periods.



Dental Clinic & Caremobile:

OneWorld's Dental Clinic is located on the third floor of our main clinic. The dental clinic has 12 state-of-the-art dental operatories (rooms), three dentists and one dental hygienist on staff. Fourth-year Creighton dental students spend a rotation at OneWorld's dental clinic, and Iowa West School of Dental Hygiene

students also provide also assist us in providing additional services to the community. OneWorld also partners with Ronald McDonald House Charities International and the local Omaha Ronald McDonald House on a mobile dental van that travels to regional schools and provides dental screenings and treatment to students on-site, called the Caremobile program.

Services for people with disabilities:

OneWorld provides assistance to patients who are unable to care for themselves due to a physical disability. Support from the Enrichment Fund assists us in providing these services.

Behavioral health & social work: Our unique model of Behavioral Health and Social Work

ensure collaboration with the medical providers to help patients with a variety of issues affecting their overall health.

Chronic Disease Care & Education:

We offer education, follow-up care, care coordination, case management, and peer education for chronic diseases such as asthma, diabetes, hypertension, high cholesterol, and depression.

STD & HIV Testing:

STD testing, outreach, and education is offered to patients.

Specialty clinics, Patient Support Services, & Volunteers:

Medical specialists volunteer time at OneWorld and provide primary and on-site specialty care through our specialty



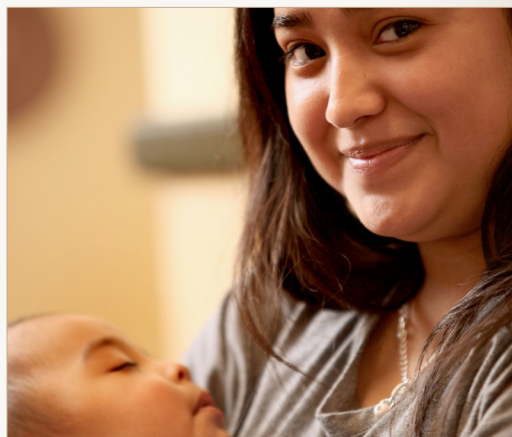
clinics. Immigration physicals, prevention of Tuberculosis, and Ear, Nose and Throat care are just a sampling of the specialties offered on-site.

OneWorld's Patient Support Staff assists patients in navigating through the health care system, specialty care referrals, interpretation, enrollment, or access to a variety of support programs. OneWorld also works with the Hope Medical Outreach Coalition to access a network of volunteers, including specialty care providers, hospitals, and other facilities who donate their services for low-income patients in need.

Prevention & Education: OneWorld provides health and prevention education through classes for Diabetic patients; a program for a family-based intervention for overweight children; the Reach Out and Read program which distributes books to underprivileged children and education on the importance of literacy to parents; oral hygiene education; various health screenings; and, school and sports physicals.

Women, Infants, & Children Nutrition:

WIC provides nutrition education and food vouchers to income-eligible mothers who are pregnant, postpartum, or breast-feeding and to children under 5 years of age.



Adult Care / Geriatrics: OneWorld provides a wide array of health care services for adult patients and seniors.

Care for the Homeless: OneWorld's medical staff provides care for clients of area shelters and we also have a partnership with the Charles Drew Community Health Center to provide care at the Siena Francis House.

OUR PATIENTS...



Kenneth Rossow **Patient Cass Family Medicine**

Kenneth Rossow first went to Cass Family Medicine because of convenience - it was located only blocks away from his house in Plattsmouth, Nebraska.

When he was first seen by a Cass Family Medicine provider, he was dealing with multiple health problems, and was not taking proper care of himself. Rossow was a truck driver, and taking off time to go to the doctor meant not getting a pay check, so he rarely went.

One day, he lost the feeling in his foot, which in turn meant he couldn't drive his truck. As a result, Rossow lost his job as well as his health insurance. Cass Family Medicine was there to help. They were able to examine

his foot, locate and treat the infection in his toe, and amputate a portion of his toe before the infection could spread. They were also able to get his blood sugars and diabetes under control.

Without the staff at Cass Family Medicine, Rossow could have lost his life, but instead, he was able to get his life back.

"They treated me like a person instead of an injury. It's really important that they are able to give something to people like me who have lost their insurance."



Zapien Family Jesus, Alma, Jesus Jr., & Alma Joana Patients **OneWorld Community Health Centers, Inc.**

Eight months after giving birth to a seemingly healthy baby girl named Alma Joana, tragedy struck the Zapien family. Alma Joana's mother, Alma, rushed little Alma Joana to the hospital after the little girl spiked a very high fever.

The high temperature caused a bacteria to spread into little Alma Joana's brain, thus causing her to go into a coma for three days. The Zapien family was heartbroken that she would not make it. Fortunately for the Zapien family, Alma Joana pulled through, but was left in a vegetative state.

The family was not only forced to accept the news that their baby girl would not live a normal and healthy life, but they were also faced

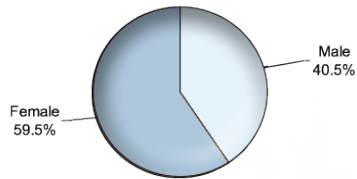
with the realization that Alma Joana's medical costs would be more than they could afford - even though both Alma and her husband Jesus worked.

With the help of OneWorld's providers and patient support staff, the Zapien family was able to get their daughter quality care from local pediatric specialists, at no cost to them.

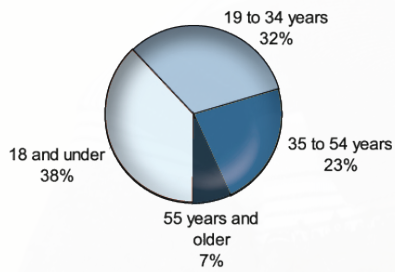

PATIENT DEMOGRAPHICS

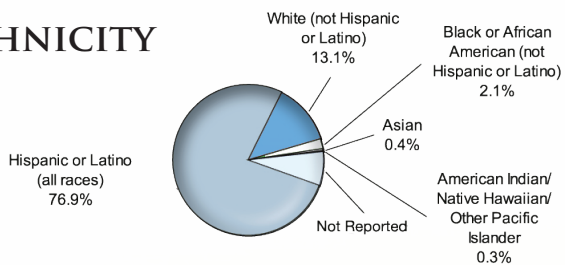
GENDER



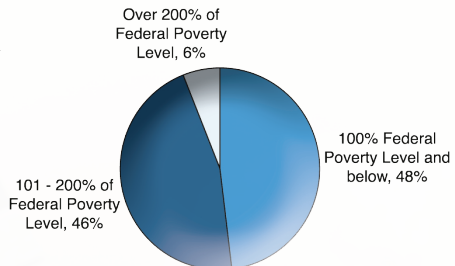
AGE

POVERTY

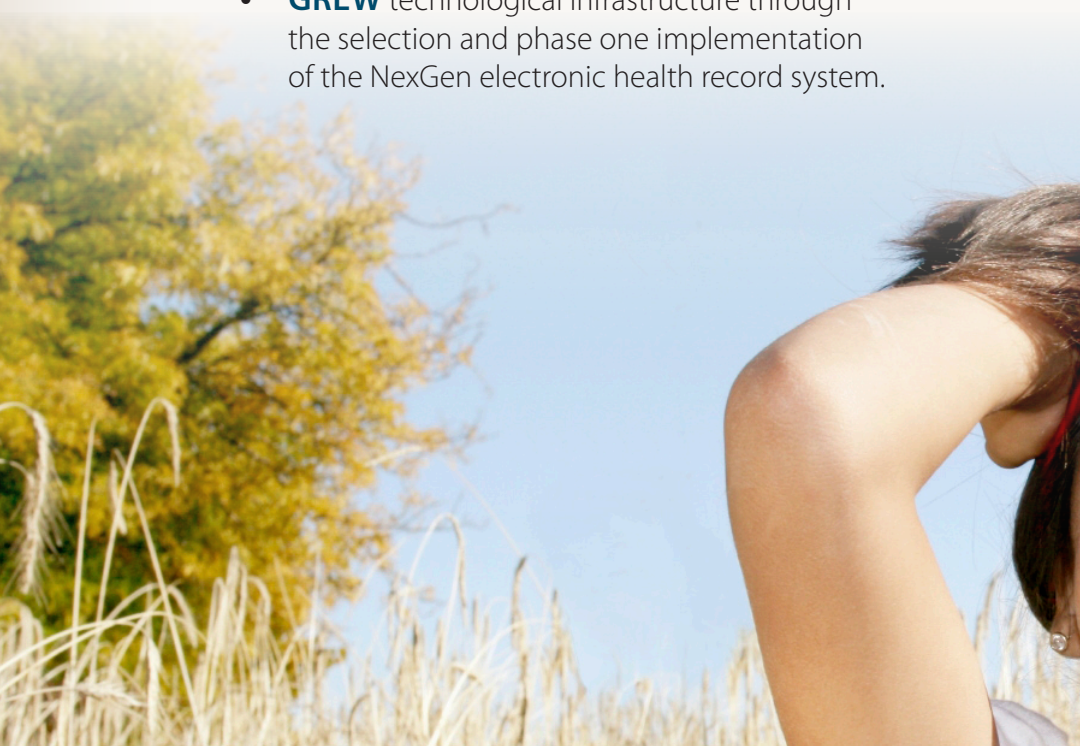


200% of Poverty in 2008 was \$42,600 for a family of four



2008 HIGHLIGHTS

- **INCREASED** the total number of clinic patients to 16,453, which reflects a 26% increase over 2007.
- **INCREASED** the total number of patient visits by 19% in 2008, totaling 65,799 (46,231 medical encounters; 5,372 dental encounters; 7,044 behavioral health encounters; and, 7,152 enabling services encounters).
- **WIC VISITS INCREASED** to 58,000 (up 7% from prior year).
- **OPENED** our first satellite clinic in Plattsmouth, Nebraska—Cass Family Medicine in January of 2008.
- **RECEIVED** federal and donor support to expand OneWorld's Behavioral Health and Dental programs.
- **GREW** technological infrastructure through the selection and phase one implementation of the NexGen electronic health record system.

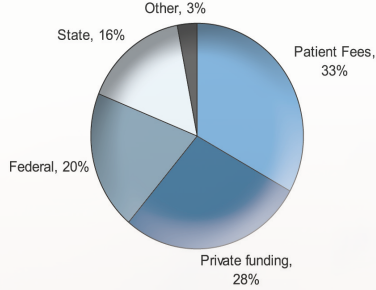


- **COMPLETED** a two-year strategic plan in December 2008, and adopted new two-year plan.

- **SCORED** “outstanding” on patient and clinical outcome measurements, which are standardized measurements required as part of our federal qualification as a community health center.

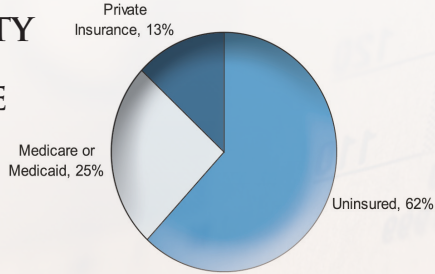


FINANCIAL STATISTICS

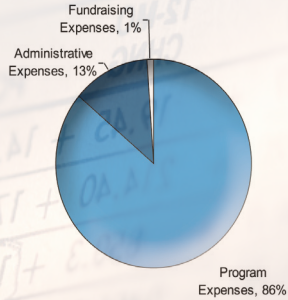
SOURCES OF REVENUE
