

Dear Friends,

As we begin to close out another year, our seventeenth, I am continually amazed at our progress in the achievement of our Corporate goals to serve the health care needs of our area's underserved populations. 1988-89 brought us the following accomplishments:

We received an "A" rating by our primary funding source, the Federal Department of Health and Human Services. Less than 15% of all clinics nationally were rated "A", and only two other clinics in California.

We have expanded our Perinatal Services program to include comprehensive support services to all pregnant women at our clinics in Los Banos, Patterson, and West Modesto. This allows us to counsel our patients regarding proper nutrition, health education topics, and psycho-social needs.

Four new primary care physicians have joined our staff. Dr. Michael McIntire, Family Practice, Dr. Pierre Scales, OB/GYN, Dr. Susan Morris, Internal Medicine, and Dr. Jeanette Lopez, Family Practice. We are very privileged to have these four well-qualified physicians join us.

The Board of Directors selected Rosa Sanchez of Gustine High School as recipient of its 4th annual scholarship. A check of \$500 was awarded to Ms. Sanchez by Board President Alicia Dicochea and Nursing Manager Joy Friguglietti at their awards ceremony in May. A straight A student, Rosa plans to attend U.C. Berkeley to become a physician.





West Modesto Medical Clinic was awarded continued funding to provide health services to homeless people in Modesto. This comprehensive project involves cooperation and coordination with related agencies such as the Salvation Army, the Men's and Women's Mission shelters, County Mental Health, County Substance Abuse, and various participating specialist providers.

And finally, Deborah Meltvedt and Nina Martinez have been hired to do AIDS community education and individual counseling to our patients. They will teach our patients about this dreadful disease: what it is, how it is contracted, how it is prevented. This is another example of the versatility of our agency to respond to one of the most serious health problems we have ever faced.

As you can tell, the theme of this year's report is children. The family. It is those two words that best describe what we are all about. Last year, over sixty percent of our patient users were children and pregnant mothers. Our primary goal is to bring healthy babies into this world, and once here, keep them that way. Let us not forget, our children are our future.



Dos Palos was started in 1986 in response to a needs assessment which was highlighted by health access problems for farmworkers, a hospital in dire fiscal crisis, and the retirement of two of its three physicians. Housed in an attractive modular clinic, medical services are provided by Dr. Ben Douglas and Jeff Armstrong, PA-C. Dos Palos Health Center is a very busy and well-managed clinic under the direction of Nurse-Manager Mary Guerrero.








The oldest and largest of the MFHC system, Childs Avenue Clinic provides the most comprehensive care including medical, dental, lab, Rx, WIC and organized health education. Childs Avenue Clinic is the heart of the MFHC system. The Board of Directors meets at Childs Avenue Clinic for their Board meetings, and the administration finds its home there. Six Physicians, two Nurse Practitioners, and one Dentist serve a variety of clientele; farmworkers, Southeast Asian refugees, South Merced neighborhood residents, and many clinic employees. PLANADA FAMILY HEALTH CENTER



Planada began in a trailer in 1981. In 1986, a new and very attractive 3,000 square foot clinic was built thanks to a loan from the Farmers Home Administration. The clinic is the only health resource available for the town of 3,000 permanent residents, predominantly farmworkers. During the months of April to October, the "main" harvest season, there is an influx of migrant farmworkers which keeps Jerry Lewis, PA-C, very busy.


