"The real purpose of the game was to foster cooperative spirit" said David Rose, of the Merced Family Health Center. He was speaking of a softball game between the center and Merced County Department of Health.

"We chose softball as the medium for our message, since it represents a vivid example of the importance of team work in achieving a desired outcome."

Rose Rodriguez, co-captain of the health department team agreed.

This first annual Health Star Softball Championship game was played before throngs of cheering health care supporters at McNamara Field. The championship game, featuring the health center and the county department of health, excited fans until the last inning, when the health center pulled away with a 23-15 victory.

Miss Rodriguez gave high marks to both sides for their teamwork, and observed, "Everybody from receptionists to physicians to environmental sanitarians to family planning counselors to dentists to nutrition aides played together tonight.

"There was a sense of open competition that made the game enjoyable to both sides," she added.
