Golden Valley Health Center celebrate its 25th anniversary

Golden Valley Health Center of Los Banos will be celebrating its organization's 25th anniversary with a health fair Sept. 19 from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. There will be free medical and dental screening, music, face painting, hot dogs and drinks. The health fair will take place at the GVHC parking lot.

Golden Valley Health Centers are a group of non-profit government subsidized centers which originally opened in Merced at the General Hospital in 1972 serving only 16 patients. Within the same year the clinic was serving 2,000 patients.

Now the organization has 14 clinics located throughout Los Banos, Merced, Dos Palos, Gustine, Planada, Le Grand, Newman, Modesto, Turlock, Patterson and Westley. The clinics offer dental and medical care including family practice, obstetrics-gynecology and internal medicine. The clinics treat approximately a total of 50,000 patients a year.

According to the dental department manager of the Los Banos facility, Michelle Cutler, the clinic's physcians and assistants also visit the Head Start Programs annually and sometimes twice a year to do dental screening. The Los Banos clinic screens more than 250 pre-schoolers. When asked, the GVHC also visits the local elementary schools. "Our community is fortunate to have a quality care facility that offers medical and dental care to anyone regardless of socio-economic circumstances," said Cutler. Cutler has been employed with GVHC for 17 years

In 1976, the organization received a rural health initiative grant which allowed for the opening of a clinic in Los Banos. It was originally named Nueva Esperanza (New Hope.) In 1977 the clinics expanded to Stanislaus County and in 1985 a new facility was opened in Planada. There are now four GVHC clinics in Modesto. For 25 years GVHC has been improving the health status of many members of **community as stated in its statement of grand values.

Barbara Sullivan, Merced's Mayor pro-Tempore, said she was proud of Golden Valley's commitment of quality service to the


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Golden Valley Health Celebrates Its Silver

A lot can change in 25 years, and Golden Valley Health Centers (GVHC)—founded in 1972 and steeped in the spirit of that time—has undergone its share of change. Formerly known as the Merced Family Health Centers, the agency changed to its current name two years ago. From its one original single site have sprung 12 more, spread out across Merced and Stanislaus counties.

Today, the health center system serves 49,000 patients each year. Over the years, GVHC has collected many hoorays—such as its recent designation as the 1996 Merced Chamber of Commerce Business of the Year—and a few harrumphs, such as those generated in the early 1980s when the local school district tried to commandeer the agency's land for a new elementary school. And CEO Mike Sullivan is working to ensure that the system he has led since its founding 25 years ago continues to change and meet both current and future challenges.
